Lost property

Parashat Ki Tisa

Hashem told Moshe to count Bnai –Yisrael not by counting each person (which can be confusing and time consuming), but by collecting a silver coin (half a Shekel) from each person and count the coins. He instructed him to do this before building the Mishkan (Temporary dwelling,



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Tabernacle) as the silver coins could be melted and used for the Mishkan.

Moshe Told Bnai – Yisrael that he was going to Mount Sinai to get the Torah, the two tablets with the Ten Commandments and he would return after forty days. Somehow the Israelites miscalculated the days and assumed that Moses deserted them. "How can we continue travelling without our leader?" they asked, "who will be our guide?" With that in mind they committed a grave sin, they decided to melt some jewellery to make a golden calf which they could worship.

When Moshe returned to the foot of Mount Sinai, he saw the golden calf with Bnai – Yisrael happily singing and dancing around it. He was shocked and angry; he felt that at that moment the Israelites did not deserve the two tablets and decided to shock them by shattering them. It worked, Bnai – Yisrael were immediately remorseful, they understood at once the severity of their sin and begged Moshe to ask Hashem for forgiveness. The following day Moshe went back to Mount Sinai for yet another forty days. He prayed to Hashem with all his might. "I will give the people another chance to receive the Ten Commandments," said Hashem.

This time when Moshe came down from the mountain, Bnai -Yisrael were waiting for him with excitement mixed with trepidation. They were delighted and thankful to Hashem for his forgiveness.
