Parashat Tzav

Parashat Tzav tells us about the five groups of korbanot (sacrifices), for example some sacrifices may be slaughtered only during the day. Hashem taught Moshe that if a korban was slaughtered during day time and its blood sprinkled before sunset, the kohanim may continue burning it all night long.

Some Kohanim were on duty in the temple all night long! And other kohanim would have to begin the avoda (work) at day break in the morning. Despite the long hours, the kohanim were always ready and eager to perform the avoda. Hashem forbade us to eat blood, a law that applied not only in the time of the temple but also today. The ashes must be lifted from the mizbeach (altar) and put on the floor always in the same spot.

They say that a miracle occurred with the ashes, the floor swallowed them and no ashes could be seen. That showed every one that Hashem accepted their offering of korbanot and that Hashem was very pleased with the kohanim's commitment to their work.

In orthodox Judaism we must 'kosher meat' before cooking and the method of doing so is as follows:

The meat (Or chicken) is soaked in cold water for half an hour. Then it is carefully salted on all sides. The salt draws out the blood. The meat is left salted for about an hour in a position which allows the blood to flow off. The meat is rinsed and it is ready for cooking. (Fortunately nowadays the butcher does this task for us).
