Over the past few weeks the children have been learning about and preparing for the festival of Pesach.

The 4 cups of grape juice, the 3 Matzot, the 4 questions and the 10 Plagues are just some of the many parts of the Pesach story and customs/ laws the children have been learning.



In addition, the children have been learning the words of a variety of songs, in preparation for the Seder. Not only have they been fine-tuning their singing skills, but the children have also been understanding the meaning of many of the songs.

One of the aspects of Pesach learnt by Years 5 and 6, is the difference between Pesach Mitzrayim and Pesach Hadorot (Pesach in Egypt and Pesach of the future generations).

The reason Jewish people eat Matzah on Pesach is to remember that the Jewish people had to leave Egypt in a hurry and there was no time for their dough to rise in to bread.



The reason why the Jewish people ate Matzah whilst still in Egypt, was because G-d wanted them to remember the importance of being modest and humble. Never to show off. By eating the Matzah, G-d was telling the Jewish people not to let their egos rise like bread, but to remain humble like unrisen matzah.
